

Design Workshop Feedback

During the Design Workshop, feedback developed around the following key points:

- Year-round Multi-Use: A concern that is shared by many residents has focused on ensuring such structures are flexible to uses that do not have to occur only during warm weather and not confined to one purpose.
- Green space: While residents have indicated that they are in favor of having more trees in the park, they have also commented that any vegetation beyond that should be minimal.
- Arts, Culture, and History: Many view the park as a place in the community where Benton Harbor's rich arts, culture, and history can be showcased.

Feedback => Planning and Design

Design Workshop feedback shaped planning recommendations and created these four planning themes:

- Enhance Multi-Use, Year Round Capacity of the Park
- Develop Partnerships between Resident and Business Organizations
- Incorporate Benton Harbor's Unique History as a Major Theme of the Park
- Preserve and Enhance Natural Features, e.g. trees, vegetation, etc.

In addition, this feedback shaped nineteen guiding points in design planning that formed the core of the images to be presented next.

Location

Located on Main Street directly across the street from City Hall, the Public Library, and several commercial buildings, Dwight P. Mitchell City Center Park forms the physical and symbolic center of the community and surrounds itself with a historic downtown that is rich with activity.



Key Design Principles


- Respect the scale of the park.
